## STAFF REPORT

## TITLE: FY 2021/22 Unmet Transit Needs Public Hearing

## SUBMITTED BY: Janet Orth, Deputy Director / CFO DATE PREPARED: 11/23/2020

#### BACKGROUND:

<u>Purpose of this public hearing</u>: The Transportation Development Act (TDA) requires that before any Local Transportation Funds are allocated for streets and roads purposes (unallocated revenues at fiscal year end), a process is conducted to identify any "unmet transit needs" that might be "reasonable to meet" for funding. This procedure has been followed annually by MCOG.

Since MCOG established a Local Transportation Fund (LTF) Reserve fund in 1999, excess funds have not been allocated at year end, but instead are carried forward to future budgets. However, there has been a general consensus of the MCOG Board, staff and stakeholders to continue identifying unmet transit needs annually. Our last two TDA performance audits commended MCOG for conducting the formal process. It allows for public input that is useful in assessing which transit services should be provided. It provides a focus for the SSTAC's annual workshop and satisfies the TDA requirement for a citizen participation process (Sec. 99238.5).

<u>Testimony received for this hearing</u>: The Social Services Transportation Advisory Council (SSTAC), a standing committee of MCOG, met for the annual Unmet Transit Needs workshop on November 16. The SSTAC recommended a list of nine needs developed in the workshop; considered and endorsed 5 needs from public input heard at MTA board meetings during the year; for a total of 14 needs, attached. Issues raised included assisted services, non-emergency medical transportation, mobility solutions for remote communities, fixed-route service for specified communities, increased trips on major highway corridors, and restoring COVID-related service cuts.

The SSTAC's duties also include advising MCOG on any other transportation issues. This year, there were no new recommendations.

#### ACTION REQUIRED:

The following process fulfills TDA requirements.

#### **Finding of Proper Notice:**

<u>The Board makes the finding, by motion and vote, that a proper 30-day notice has been given</u>. The notice of public hearing was published by the Ukiah Daily Journal (November 6), The Willits News (November 11), Fort Bragg Advocate-News (November 12), and Independent Coast Observer (November 19). Proofs of publication are attached. Only one notice of general circulation is required, met by the Ukiah paper. The notice has been posted on our web site and emailed to a list of interested stakeholders. Also it was announced at the SSTAC public meeting with participants in the draft Coordinated Plan discussion. These actions more than meet the requirement.

#### **Public Hearing:**

<u>The Chair opens the public hearing</u>. Staff reports any written testimony received for the record, including findings of the SSTAC's November 16, 2020 workshop. A list of identified needs is

attached, including unmet needs from public input received by Mendocino Transit Authority. Public testimony is received. <u>The hearing is closed</u>.

#### **Board Action:**

<u>The Board of Directors then determines</u> whether any of the testimony received appears to be an "unmet transit need" according to the attached definitions adopted by MCOG, pending further analysis. The two main options for a motion are:

- "The testimony heard <u>includes</u> Unmet Transit Needs that appear to qualify under MCOG's adopted definitions, and those needs are directed to Mendocino Transit Authority for analysis and for further review and recommendations by the SSTAC and the Transit Productivity Committee."
- 2) "The testimony heard <u>does not include any</u> Unmet Transit Needs that appear to qualify under MCOG's adopted definitions, therefore there are no unmet transit needs found for fiscal year 2020/21, and the annual process is concluded."

<u>If the finding is "yes," testimony does include unmet needs, the list of needs is directed to MTA</u> to prepare an analysis that may include operational costs, ability to provide service, and prioritization of needs. Finally the analysis would go to MCOG's Transit Productivity Committee (TPC), in April or May 2021, for a recommendation to MCOG on which, if any, needs are "reasonable to meet" for inclusion in MTA's 2021/22 Transit Claim, due to MCOG April 1, 2021. The analysis and recommendation also would be discussed by the SSTAC. In June, when MCOG allocates funds to the transit claim, a finding of "reasonableness" is made.

<u>If none of the testimony qualifies as an "unmet transit need</u>," the Board makes a finding that "there are no unmet transit needs" and the annual process is ended. (Rarely, if ever, is this the case.)

#### ALTERNATIVES:

The Board may cancel or postpone this already noticed hearing. - not recommended

Also note TDA Sec. 99238.5(b): "In addition to public hearings, the transportation planning agency shall consider other methods of obtaining public feedback on public transportation needs. Those methods may include, but are not limited to, teleconferencing, questionnaires, telecanvassing, and electronic mail." In this case we have used e-mail and MCOG's website.

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

Staff recommends that the Board:

Make a finding of proper notice and hear the staff report. 2) Hold the public hearing.
 After hearing all testimony, make a finding that:

"The testimony heard <u>includes</u> Unmet Transit Needs that appear to qualify under MCOG's adopted definitions, and those needs are directed to Mendocino Transit Authority for analysis and for further review and recommendations by the Transit Productivity Committee and Social Services Transportation Advisory Council."

#### "Unmet Transit Needs" and "Reasonable to Meet" Process

#### **Introduction**

The stated intent of the Legislature in passing the Transportation Development Act (TDA) was to provide funding for transit, which would provide an essential public service through a balanced transportation system. The TDA administrative code specifically states, "it is the intent of the Legislature to improve existing public transportation services and encourage regional public transportation coordination." The Public Utilities Code, in Article 2, Section 99220 provides even more succinctly: "to encourage people to use public transportation rather than private vehicles."

Prior to using TDA funds for street and road improvements, Sections 99401.5 and 99401.6 of TDA require the Regional Transportation Planning Agency to hold a public hearing and make a determination that there are no unmet transit needs that can reasonably be met within the area of a county, city or eligible operator. As a result, the RTPA has the responsibility and authority to determine what constitutes unmet transit needs and whether or not such unmet transit needs can reasonably be met.

The Mendocino Council of Governments (MCOG), acting in its official capacity as the designated Regional Transportation Planning Agency for Mendocino County, accomplishes this in part through a public hearing process conducted by MCOG taking into account the recommendations of the Social Services Transportation Advisory Council and other various factors in the transportation planning process.

#### **Definitions**

The following definitions of "Unmet Transit Need" and "Reasonable to Meet" have been adopted by the Mendocino Council of Governments.

The unmet needs and reasonableness policies apply to new proposed services. Existing services will be evaluated through the existing performance standard policies established by MCOG, and reviewed by the Transit Productivity Committee.

- 1. <u>Unmet Transit Need</u>: Whenever a need to transport people is not being satisfied through existing public or private resources.
- 2. <u>Reasonable to Meet</u>: It is reasonable to meet a transit need if all of the following conditions prevail:

"Unmet Transit Needs" and "Reasonable to Meet" Process Page 2 of 2 12/7/98

- a) Service will be capable of meeting the Transportation Development Act fare revenue/operating cost requirements and established MCOG criteria for new services
- b) Transit services designed or intended to address an unmet transit need shall not duplicate transit services currently provided either publicly or privately
- c) The claimant this is expected to provide the service shall review, evaluate and indicate that the service is operationally feasible, and vehicles shall be currently available in the market place
- d) Funds are available, or there is a reasonable expectation that funds will become available.

#### BACKGROUND:

The 2005 federal transportation bill, Safe, Accountable, Flexible, and Efficient Transportation Equity Act – A Legacy for Users (SAFETEA-LU), emphasized the importance of public participation as part of the transportation planning process. The bill established the requirement for a public participation plan to be used by the Regional Transportation Planning Agencies in their planning processes. These requirements were included in the current federal transportation bill, the Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act, passed in 2015.

To comply with SAFETEA-LU, MCOG adopted a public participation plan in November 2008. As part of the current update to the Regional Transportation Plan (RTP), staff felt that it was appropriate to update the public participation plan to reflect existing conditions.

Per the federal transportation bill, the public participation plan is to be made available for public review and comment for 45 days prior to adoption at a public hearing. Notice of the public review period and hearing was published in four newspapers throughout the county between October 21 and October 23.

The plan that is before the Board for consideration today is designed to act as a menu of options available for use in public outreach strategies. It allows flexibility as the appropriate level of and approach to outreach varies from one project to another.

#### ACTION REQUIRED:

#### 1. Finding of Proper Notice:

The Board makes the finding, by motion and vote, that a 45-day notice has been given. The notice of public review period and hearing was published by the Ukiah Daily Journal (October 21), The Willits News (October 21), Fort Bragg Advocate-News (October 22), and Independent Coast Observer (October 23). Proofs of publication are attached. The notice was also posted on our web site.

#### 2. Public Hearing:

The Chair opens the public hearing. Staff reports any written comments received for the record during the 45-day period. Public comments are received. <u>The hearing is closed</u>.

#### 3. Board Action:

The Board then determines whether or not to adopt the updated Public Participation Plan.

#### ALTERNATIVES:

## INTRODUCTION

#### Background

The Mendocino Council of Governments (MCOG), the Regional Transportation Planning Agency (RTPA) for the Mendocino County region, was established in 1972 by a Joint Powers Agreement between the County and the four incorporated cities (Ukiah, Willits, Fort Bragg, and Point Arena. The MCOG Board consists of seven members— two county supervisors, a county elected official, and one council member from each of the four incorporated cities.

#### Region

Mendocino County lies within the northern extension of California's coast mountain ranges. These mountains are characterized by a series of southeast to northwest ridges that are separated occasionally by narrow valleys. The coastline is also rugged and rocky, offering spectacular views of the ocean. Much of the land area is taken by State and National Forest lands, with the remainder used for agriculture, residential and other uses. Transportation routes tend to be located within valleys, and east-west travel is especially difficult, since parallel ridges must be traversed. The mountainous nature of the County tends to minimize ground transportation options throughout the region.

The 2020 California Department of Finance population estimates place Mendocino County's population at 88,388. This includes an unincorporated population of 59,330 and an incorporated population of 29,058. Four cities share the incorporated population: Ukiah (16,029), Fort Bragg (7,471), Willits (5,117), and Point Arena (441).

The bulk of the population in Mendocino County is concentrated in a few areas of the county. Ukiah, Talmage, Calpella, and Redwood Valley make up the largest single population concentration. Fort Bragg and the coastal area southward to the Navarro River is another population center. Willits, the surrounding Little Lake Valley, and the Brooktrails subdivision comprise the only other large settlement area in the county. Much of the rest of Mendocino County is rural and undeveloped.

#### Federal Transportation Bill Requirements

The 2005 federal transportation bill, Safe, Accountable, Flexible and Efficient Transportation Equity Act – A Legacy for Users (SAFETEA-LU), emphasized the importance of public participation as part of the transportation planning process. The bill established the requirement for a public participation plan to be used by Regional Transportation Planning Agencies in their planning processes. These requirements were included in the current federal transportation bill, the Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act, passed in 2015.

#### Purpose of This Plan

MCOG recognizes the importance of public participation as well as interagency and intergovernmental participation. Without input and involvement from members of the public, affected agencies, community groups, and other interested parties it would be difficult to develop a transportation program that effectively meets the needs of the county and its communities.

This plan will provide a clear directive for the public participation activities of MCOG, particularly as they pertain to the agency's primary responsibilities, which include development and implementation of the following:

- Regional Transportation Plan (RTP)
- Regional Transportation Improvement Program (RTIP)
- Annual Overall Work Program (OWP)
- Administration of Transit Development Act (TDA) funds
- Federal and state grant programs
- Coordinated Human Transportation Plan
- Transit studies
- Area transportation plans
- Special projects

# ADVISORY COMMITTEES

Three standing committees aid MCOG in performing its transportation planning functions.

The **Policy Advisory Committee** (PAC) is composed of MCOG members and a Caltrans District 1 representative. At each MCOG Board meeting, the board members adjourn as the RTPA and reconvene as the PAC. Most items on the agenda are considered and voted on by the PAC, then ratified by MCOG. This allows Caltrans to participate in voting. The PAC typically meets once a month in conjunction with MCOG Board meetings.

The **Technical Advisory Committee** (TAC) is composed of planning and public works representatives from each of the Joint Powers entities, the Mendocino Transit Authority (MTA) General Manager, representatives from rail transportation and air quality, and a Caltrans transportation planner. The TAC considers and votes on matters of a technical nature. The TAC also makes recommendations to the MCOG Board on matters that will appear on their agendas. The TAC typically meets once a month.

The **Transit Productivity Committee** (TPC) is composed of two members from the MCOG Board of Directors, two members from Mendocino Transit Authority's Board of Directors, and one senior center representative selected by the selected by the senior centers under MCOG's jurisdiction. The purpose of the TPC is to review transit performance and productivity issues in accordance with approved standards adopted by MCOG, including review of quarterly reports from MTA. The TPC will review and make recommendations to MCOG on the annual Transit Claim, and provide input on the "unmet transit needs" process, including findings of the SSTAC. Meetings will be held at least once annually, or quarterly if needed.

Senate Bill 498, approved in 1987, established the **Social Services Transportation Advisory Council** (SSTAC) which represents interests of the elderly, disabled, and persons of limited means. The SSTAC membership consists of a potential transit user 60 years of age or older, a potential transit user who is disabled, two representatives from social services providers for seniors, two representatives from local social service providers for the disabled, one representative from a local social service provider for persons of limited means, and two representatives from the local Consolidated Transportation Service Agency (MTA). The SSTAC is typically involved in transit related projects and plans, including the annual unmet transit needs process, Coordinated Human Services Transportation Plan and FTA grant programs. The SSTAC meets in the spring and fall.

Additional committees are formed on an as needed basis, typically to advise on a particular project or serve a specific function, such as a study advisory group.

## PUBLIC & AGENCY PARTICIPATION GOALS & STRATEGIES

**Goal 1:** Provide all interested parties and agencies reasonable opportunities for involvement in the transportation planning process.

<u>Strategy 1.1</u>: Provide adequate public notice of public participation opportunities and activities and time for public review of regionally significant plans and documents.

<u>Strategy 1.2</u>: Utilize MCOG website as a means to alert the public and other agencies of the opportunity for public involvement in the transportation planning process when appropriate.

<u>Strategy 1.3</u>: Evaluate plans, programs, and projects to determine the most appropriate and effective tools and strategies for public and agency involvement and outreach.

<u>Strategy 1.4</u>: Provide the opportunity to comment on draft planning documents to affected local, state, federal and tribal agencies.

<u>Strategy 1.5</u>: Make transportation planning documents available for viewing on the MCOG website. Regionally significant documents, such as

the RTP, shall also be made available at key locations throughout the County including public libraries.

<u>Strategy 1.6</u>: In developing the RTP and other regionally significant plans, MCOG will consult with local, state, federal and tribal agencies and officials that may be affected by proposed planning activities, including planning, transportation, environmental, economic development, housing, private industry, and resource agencies, as appropriate.

<u>Strategy 1.7</u>: Prior to adoption, provide additional opportunity for public and agency review and comment if a regionally significant plan, including the RTP, differs significantly from the draft that was made available for public review and raises new material issues which could not reasonably have been foreseen from the public involvement efforts.

<u>Strategy 1.8</u>: During the transportation planning process, MCOG and its advisory bodies shall conduct open public meetings in accordance with the Brown Act (CGC Sec. 54950 et seq).

<u>Strategy 1.9</u>: Agendas for all MCOG board meetings and meetings of standing advisory bodies shall be posted a minimum of 72 hours prior to the meeting.

**Goal 2:** Increase public awareness and understanding of the transportation planning process in Mendocino County.

<u>Strategy 2.1:</u> Utilize MCOG's website to increase awareness of current transportation planning activities, and when appropriate, to communicate with the public about specific projects and plans in a non-technical, easily understood format.

<u>Strategy 2.2</u>: Employ visualization techniques as part of public involvement when appropriate.

<u>Strategy 2.3</u>: Provide information on regionally significant plans and projects to the local media for inclusion in their publications and/or reports.

<u>Strategy 2.4</u>: Maintain the MCOG website with current transportation planning activities, including reports and plans, as well as agendas and minutes for MCOG Board meetings.

<u>Strategy 2.5</u>: When appropriate, present information about specific plans and projects at public forums, such as City Council and Board of Supervisors meetings for increased public and governmental awareness. **Goal 3:** Ensure accessibility to the transportation planning process and information for all members of the community.

<u>Strategy 3.1</u>: Hold public meetings at locations that are convenient and accessible to the public.

<u>Strategy 3.2</u>: When selecting meeting locations for community outreach activities, prioritize those locations that are accessible by means of public transit.

<u>Strategy 3.3</u>: When appropriate, incorporate tools that allow for alternate methods of participation.

<u>Strategy 3.4</u>: Make transportation planning documents available for viewing on the MCOG website. Regionally significant documents, such as the RTP, shall also be made available at key locations throughout the County including public libraries.

<u>Strategy 3.5</u>: Make every effort to accommodate requests for accessibility opportunities, including physical accessibility to public meetings as well as accessibility to information.

**Goal 4:** Maintain contact with interested individuals and agencies throughout the process of developing plans and projects.

<u>Strategy 4.1</u>: Encourage early involvement in the transportation planning process by providing timely notification and access to information regarding the development of plans and projects.

<u>Strategy 4.2</u>: Utilize citizen and/or agency advisory groups as a means of providing input to the transportation planning process. For some projects or plans, the TAC or SSTAC may serve this role.

<u>Strategy 4.3</u>: Maintain a contact list of agencies and individuals that may be interested in a specific project or plan.

<u>Strategy 4.4</u>: Identify key individuals and organizations, including small community organizations, that may be interested in or affected by a plan or program.

<u>Strategy 4.5</u>: Prior to adoption, provide additional opportunity for public and agency review and comment if a regionally significant plan, including the RTP, differs significantly from the draft that was made available for public review and raises new material issues which could not reasonably have been foreseen from the public involvement efforts.

**Goal 5:** Increase opportunities for those traditionally under-served, including the elderly, low income, disabled, and minority households, to participate in the transportation planning process.

<u>Strategy 5.1:</u> Utilize the Social Services Transportation Advisory Council (SSTAC) as a means of obtaining input and recommendations for plans and programs impacting the elderly, disabled and low-income communities, including the RTP and Coordinated Human Services Transportation Plan.

<u>Strategy 5.2</u>: Encourage representation on the SSTAC to be reflective of the underserved communities within Mendocino County.

<u>Strategy 5.3</u>: Offer key information, such as notices and announcements, in alternative languages when appropriate or requested.

<u>Strategy 5.4</u>: Provide the opportunity for alternative forms of public input (website, email, etc.) for individuals who are unable to attend public meetings or workshops.

<u>Strategy 5.5</u>: When appropriate, utilize alternative media outlets that may target minority or underserved segments of the community.

**Goal 6:** Consider public and agency input and comments as an integral part of MCOG's decision making process.

<u>Strategy 6.1</u>: Utilize citizen and/or agency advisory groups as a means of providing input to the transportation planning process. The TAC may serve in this function if appropriate.

<u>Strategy 6.2</u>: Conduct public opinion surveys to help identify the needs, interests and concerns of the population when appropriate.

<u>Strategy 6.3</u>: Consider the input of local, state, federal, and tribal agencies during the decision-making process.

<u>Strategy 6.4</u>: As appropriate, incorporate concerns, issues, and suggestions of the public and agencies when developing plans and projects.

**Goal 7:** Consult with tribal governments within Mendocino County and provide opportunities for tribal government input into the transportation planning process.

<u>Strategy 7.1</u>: Provide early notice of the development of transportation plans and programs to all tribal governments within Mendocino County.

<u>Strategy 7.2</u>: Provide the opportunity for direct consultation with tribal councils and/or administrators as part of the transportation planning process.

<u>Strategy 7.3</u>: Provide the opportunity for tribal governments and the tribal community to review significant plans and programs, including the Regional Transportation Plan and the Regional Transportation Improvement Program.

## PUBLIC PARTICIPATION TOOLS

This section describes the public participation tools used by MCOG.

### Most Common Public Participation Tools:

<u>MCOG Website</u>: MCOG's website, www.mendocinocog.org, provides MCOG's contact information, public notices, and meeting agendas and minutes. The site also includes transportation plans and programs, local transportation studies, and documents for public review and comment. The site allows visitors to subscribe to mailing lists to receive email updates on Board Agendas, news, and other topics.

<u>Contact Lists</u>: MCOG staff maintains a master list of all contacts, including public agencies, businesses, community groups, and members of the public. The list is used to establish and maintain a list of e-mail and regular mail contacts for general communications, electronic meeting notifications, and announcements.

<u>Legal Advertisements</u>: Legal notices are required to be published in a newspaper of countywide circulation. MCOG typically publishes notices in the Ukiah Daily Journal. Notices for items that may be of greater regional concern may also be published in the Fort Bragg Advocate, Independent Coast Observer, or Willits News. Notices may advertise meetings, agendas, or public comment periods on proposed plans, programs, or documents. The timeframe required for publication of legal notices varies depending on the type of project or plan being considered.

<u>Project Workshops/Open-Houses</u>: Public and agency workshops are often held during development of various transportation plans. Workshops may be held at the initial stage of plan development and later in the process to allow the public opportunity to comment on a draft plan or project concept. These are typically casual, open meeting formats. Notices of workshops may be advertised in the newspaper and on the website and often promoted through direct mailings or emails as well.

<u>Small Group Meetings</u>: These types of meetings would typically be with study or project advisory groups convened for specific projects. Meetings of these groups would take place during project development and for project or plan review.

<u>Public Hearings</u>: Public hearings are used to solicit public comments on a project or issue being considered by MCOG. Hearings provide a formal setting for citizens to provide comments to MCOG or another decision-making body. The requirement for a formal public hearing is usually statutorily established as is the need to publish a legal notice for the public hearing.

<u>Press Releases</u>: Press releases are sent to local media (newspaper, television, and radio) to announce upcoming meetings and activities and to provide information on specific issues being considered by MCOG or its committees.

<u>Availability of Plans and Documents</u>: Documents at all stages will be available for review by the public at the MCOG office and on the MCOG website. A copy of key regional draft documents, such as the RTP, may also be made available at other locations throughout the County, such as the public libraries.

#### Other Possible Tools for Public Outreach

<u>Display Ads</u>: Display ads in newspapers or on websites may be used to promote meetings that are not regularly scheduled or agenda items that may be of wide public interest. They are used to reach a larger audience than those that typically read legal ads. Display ads may also be used to advertise public comment periods on proposed plans, programs, or documents.

<u>Direct Mailings</u>: Letters or announcements may be mailed to lists of individuals or agencies regarding a specific project. Typically, the mailing list will be customized for a specific project.

<u>Posters and Flyers</u>: This tool would typically be used to promote a public workshop or meeting. The posters and flyers would be distributed at public places, such as city halls, libraries, and community centers for display. The announcement may contain a brief description of the purpose of the meeting/event, the time(s) and location(s), and contact information. Posters and flyers may be used to reach a large audience that cannot be reached using direct mailings and/or newsletters.

<u>Surveys</u>: Surveys may be used to gauge public opinion on certain issues. This tool has been used in the past to measure public support of a sales tax measure for transportation.

<u>Radio and Television Ads</u>: Paid radio and television ads may be used to generate public interest and involvement.

<u>Member/Project Partner Agencies</u>: MCOG may ask that member agencies (County and cities) or project partner agencies (such as Caltrans) share information about projects, events, or public engagement opportunities on their websites, social media accounts, or by other commonly used means.

## PUBLIC PARTICIPATION PERFORMANCE MEASURES

The strategies and goals contained in this plan will be reviewed periodically to analyze their effectiveness and determine if modification to this plan is necessary. Strategies may be modified and additional strategies may be added to improve the public participation process.

The following indicators may be used in reviewing and determining the effectiveness of this plan:

- Number of public meetings and workshops
- Number and origin of participants at public meetings and workshops
- Number of hits to the MCOG website
- Number of comments received during the public comment period for projects and programs
- Revisions to plans or projects based on citizen and agency input

# **TITLE:** Authorizing Resolution for Regional Early Action Planning (REAP) Funds

**BACKGROUND:** In 2019, AB 101 (the budget trailer bill), established the Local Government Planning Support Grants Program (LGPSGP), intended to fund planning related to housing production and implementation of the Regional Housing Needs Allocation (RHNA). Part of this program is the Regional Early Action Planning (REAP) Program, providing one-time, formula-based funding to multi-county agencies or COGs responsible for RHNA. Under this program, MCOG is eligible to receive a total of \$383,245 to be used for activities that "increase housing planning and accelerate housing production." Eligible activities include providing technical assistance, performing infrastructure planning, and conducting feasibility studies. Funds may also be suballocated to cities and counties for these activities. The JPA Amendment approved by MCOG in April allowed MCOG to participate in the program.

Regions can apply for funding until January 31, 2021, and will have until August of 2023 to complete expenditure. Initial discussions with representatives from the local agency planning and community development departments, as well as the Technical Advisory Committee have identified ideas for potential projects. Per discussion from last month's Board meeting, MCOG will be suballocating the majority of the funding, excluding a small portion for MCOG staff time. Suballocating funds also allows agencies the options of combining them with other grant funding made available through AB 101. In November, the Board adopted the funding distribution formula recommended by staff.

One of the requirements to receive REAP funds is the submission of a fully executed resolution authorizing the application for, and receipt of, REAP funds. Upon Board approval of the resolution, staff will be authorized to submit a REAP application.

Staff will be available at the meeting to present the projects proposed by each agency.

### **ACTION REQUIRED:** By resolution, authorize the following:

- 1. Direct the Executive Director to request an allocation of LGPSGP funds
- 2. The Executive Director to execute the Allocation Application on behalf of MCOG
- 3. The Executive Director to enter into, execute, and deliver a State of California Standard Agreement for a maximum amount of \$383,245, and any and all other documents necessary to secure funding.

**ALTERNATIVES:** The Council could elect to not apply for REAP funds.

**RECOMMENDATION:** Adopt the attached resolution authorizing the following:

- The State of California (the "State"), Department of Housing and Community Development ("Department") issued a Notice and Opportunity for Funding Allocation (NOFA) and Application on February 18, 2020;
- The Mendocino Council of Governments (MCOG) is the Regional Entity in Mendocino County eligible to apply for an allocation pursuant to Health and Safety Code section 50515.02(a) to develop and accelerate the implementation of the requirements contained in the MCOG's application pursuant to Health and Safety Code section 50515.02(d)(1) including the development of an education and outreach strategy related to the sixth cycle regional housing needs allocation; and
- The Department shall approve the allocation request, subject to the terms and conditions of Eligibility, the NOFA, which includes the guidelines and program requirements, and the Standard Agreement by and between the Department and the Local Government Planning Support Grant Recipients; therefore, be it

#### **RESOLVED, THAT:**

- 1. The Mendocino Council of Governments is hereby authorized pursuant to Health and Safety Code section 50515.02(a) and directs the Executive Director to request an allocation pursuant to the Department's calculation in accordance with the population estimates consistent with the methodology described in subdivision (a) of Section 50515.03. Each council of governments or regional entity may, in consultation with the Department and consistent with program requirements, determine the appropriate use of funds or suballocations within its boundaries to appropriately address its unique housing and planning priorities.
- 2. The Executive Director is authorized to execute the Allocation Application, on behalf of the Mendocino Council of Governments as required by the Department for receipt of LGPSGP funds by submitting the following information:
  - (a) An allocation budget for the funds provided pursuant to this section.
  - (b) The amounts retained by the council of governments, regional entity, or county, and any suballocations to jurisdictions.

- (c) An explanation of how proposed uses will increase the housing planning and facilitate local housing production.
- (d) Identification of current best practices at the regional and statewide level that promote sufficient supply of housing affordable to all income levels, and a strategy for increasing adoption of these practices at the regional level, where viable.
- (e) An education and outreach strategy to inform local agencies of the need and benefits of taking early action to the sixth cycle regional housing needs allocation.
- 3. When MCOG receives its allocation of LGPSGP funds in the authorized maximum amount of \$383,245 from the Department pursuant to the above referenced Allocation Application, it represents and certifies that it will use all such funds only for eligible activities as set forth in Health and Safety Code section 50515.02(e), as approved by the Department and in accordance with all LGPSGP requirements, NOFA guidelines, all applicable state federal statues, rules, regulations, and the Standard Agreement executed by and between the Applicant and the Department.
- 4. The Executive Director is authorized to enter into, execute, and deliver a State of California Standard Agreement for the maximum amount of \$383,245, and any and all other documents required or deemed necessary or appropriate to evidence and secure the LGPSGP allocation, the MCOG obligations related thereto and all amendments the Department deems necessary and in accordance with LGPSGP.

### TITLE: FY 2020/21 Budget Amendment: Regional Early Action Planning (REAP) Grant Funds

SUBMITTED BY: Janet Orth, Deputy Director / CFO DATE: 11.20.2020

### BACKGROUND:

As discussed in our Council meetings of March, April and November 2020, the new Regional Early Action Planning (REAP) Program, created by AB 101, is funding regional planning related to housing production and implementation of the Regional Housing Needs Allocation (RHNA). To this end, MCOG amended its Joint Powers Agreement (JPA) to add housing matters as a specific power. This JPA amendment process was completed in September, with all five member agencies having passed approving resolutions.

MCOG is now able to apply for **\$383,245**. Eligible activities include providing technical assistance, performing infrastructure planning, and conducting feasibility studies. Funds may also be suballocated to cities and counties for these activities. MCOG staff has been working with the local member agencies to develop an application for the REAP program, intending to suballocate most of the funds. Once the application is submitted, a new Master Agreement with the Department of Housing & Community Development will be needed to receive the grant funds, as was approved by the Council. At the November meeting, a formula was selected that will suballocate REAP funds proportionate to the Low- and Very Low-Income RHNA allocations for each agency.

Since this is a new source of funds, an amendment is proposed for the 2020/21 Budget. Attached are a draft resolution and amended budget summary pages with the REAP revenues and allocation highlighted, anticipating the grant award.

### ACTION REQUIRED:

Amend the FY 2020/21 Regional Transportation Planning Agency (RTPA) Budget to add the REAP grant funds from California Department of Housing & Community Development.

### ALTERNATIVES:

The five member local governments have expressed their intentions to receive these housing planning funds through MCOG by adopting resolutions amending the JPA to allow this activity. Alternatives could be considered for the manner and format of the housing grant budget. The budget for housing funds could be made separate from the RTPA transportation budget. In the interests of cohesion and efficiency, a simple amendment to the existing RTPA budget is recommended. If in the future the housing program activity is significantly expanded, the format might be reconsidered.

### **RECOMMENDATION:**

Approve the FY 2020/21 RTPA Budget Amendment by adopting the REAP budget resolution and revised summary pages as prepared by staff.

### The Mendocino Council of Governments (MCOG) meets as the Board of Directors of:

Mendocino Regional Transportation Planning Agency (RTPA) and Mendocino County Service Authority for Freeway Emergencies (SAFE)

**1. Call to Order / Roll Call.** The meeting was called to order at 1:33 p.m. with Directors Rex Jackman (Caltrans/PAC), Jim Brown, Larry Stranske, John Haschak, Michael Carter and Dan Gjerde present by Zoom teleconference; Chair Gjerde presiding. Director Richey Wasserman was absent, and Director Tess Albin-Smith announced she would leave the meeting at 1:45 for election duties.

<u>Staff present on the call</u>: Nephele Barrett, Executive Director; Janet Orth, Deputy Director/CFO; Loretta Ellard, Deputy Planner; Lisa Davey-Bates, Planning Principal; James Sookne, Program Manager; Alexis Pedrotti, Project Manager; Danielle Casey, Project Coordinator, and Monica Galliani, Administrative Assistant.

**Note:** Public comment was invited via online comment form; staff monitored for incoming comments throughout the meeting, reporting periodically.

### 2. Convene as RTPA

### 3. Recess as RTPA – Reconvene as Policy Advisory Committee

**4. Public Expression**. Jessica Stull-Otto of Round Valley shared her concerns about unsafe driving that has been going on in Round Valley in recent months. She reported that she has witnessed many cars speeding in 25 mph zones in the downtown area, noted recent fatalities, and asked that Round Valley be focused on in upcoming traffic safety studies for the county. Ms. Barrett clarified that Ms. Stull-Otto was referring to the Local Road Safety Plans, for which MCOG has a request for proposals (RFP) out now, and invited all to an upcoming Municipal Advisory Council meeting in Covelo on November 4 at 6:00 p.m. Director Jackman will forward these comments to Caltrans.

**5.** Recognition of Retiring Board Member – Richey Wasserman. This item was continued to next month's meeting.

### 6. Covelo SR 162 Corridor Multi-Purpose Trail Project

a. <u>Concurrence or Direction to Staff on Additional Contracting</u>. Ms. Barrett summarized her staff report and gave a breakdown of the funding history of the project. George Rau/Munselle Engineering had previously been a subconsultant to GHD, the principal consultant. Their work under GHD's contract has come to an end, but there is now a need for additional surveying and legal description work to complete the right-of-way (ROW) appraisal and acquisition process. An initial estimate provided by George Rau identifies another \$90,000 in work remaining. Grant funding for ROW totals \$213,000, and there is approximately \$135,000 remaining in approved Regional Surface Transportation Program (RSTP) funds. The BRI contract is for \$150,358. Mr. Sookne noted Rau's contract would require the remaining programmed ROW grant funding and part of the RSTP, leaving very little for acquisition. Ms. Barrett recommended that the board provide staff direction to move forward with the Rau/Munselle contract. Ms. Barrett added that staff has been working with Caltrans on an application for additional funding through the Complete Streets program, which funds safety and multi-modal projects on state highways.

The Board discussed options and timeline. No public comments were received. Staff was directed to proceed with the Rau contract negotiation, and the Ad Hoc committee can decide whether the matter should be returned to the full Board.

 <u>Appointment of Ad Hoc Committee</u>. Directors Haschak and Carter volunteered to serve.
 <u>Upon motion</u> by Brown, second by Haschak, and carried unanimously on roll call vote (6 Ayes – Brown, Stranske, Carter, Haschak, Jackman/PAC, and Gjerde; 0 Noes; 0 Abstaining; 2 Absent - Wasserman and Albin-Smith); IT IS ORDERED that Directors Haschak and Carter are appointed to serve on the Ad Hoc Committee for the Covelo SR 162 Corridor Multi-Purpose Trail Project.

7. Approval of Local Agency Funding Formula for Regional Early Action Planning (REAP) Grant from California Department of Housing & Community Development. Ms. Barrett explained that, as discussed several times this year, MCOG is eligible to receive \$383,245 through the REAP program. Staff is working with local agencies to determine how best to use that money, recommending suballocation of the funds. Mr. Sookne referred to his spreadsheet and provided three different prospective funding distribution formulas. Staff recommended using Scenario 2, which would suballocate REAP funds proportionate to the Low- and Very Low-Income regional housing needs allocations for each agency. Director Gjerde expressed his interest in the grant program and is looking forward to its results despite challenges staff may face.

**Upon motion** by Brown, second by Carter, and carried unanimously on roll call vote (6 Ayes – Brown, Stranske, Carter, Wasserman, Haschak, Jackman/PAC, and Gjerde; 0 Noes; 0 Abstaining; 2 Absent - Albin-Smith and Wasserman): IT IS ORDERED that Scenario #2 is approved to distribute REAP funds proportionate to the Low- and Very Low-Income RHNA allocations for each MCOG member agency.

**8.** Consent Calendar. Upon motion by Haschak, second by Carter, and carried unanimously on roll call vote (6 Ayes – Brown, Stranske, Carter, Haschak, Jackman/PAC, and Gjerde; 0 Noes; 0 Abstaining; 2 Absent - Wasserman and Albin-Smith); IT IS ORDERED that consent items are approved:

Upon motion by Carter, second by Haschak, and carried unanimously on roll call vote (5 Ayes – Brown, Stranske, Carter, Haschak, and Gjerde; 0 Noes; 0 Abstaining; 2 Absent - Wasserman and Albin-Smith): IT IS ORDERED that the actions taken by the Policy Advisory Committee are ratified by the MCOG Board of Directors.

### **10. Reports - Information**

- a. Caltrans District 1 Projects Update and Information
  - i. *State Route 20 at Blosser Lane in Willits.* Director Jackman used the Caltrans ArcMapping tool to provide images of the two proposed interim improvement options for the Blosser Lane intersection. He added that there may be other things included in the plan that are not visible from the map, such as flashing pedestrian beacons. Director Gjerde mentioned that the road leading to the intersection does not currently indicate a need for reduced speeds, which led him to prefer the option of building a roundabout for the intersection. Director Stranske also commented that the downhill slope leading to Blosser Lane causes drivers to pass through at excessive speeds. Discussion about safety benefits of each plan ensued. Comments on the Project Initiation Document are due November 6, with the final document expected December 18.
  - ii. *District 1 Active Transportation Plan.* Director Jackman reported that consultants are finalizing the existing conditions report for the District 1 Active Transportation Plan (ATP). There are online surveys for the general public and members of the Technical

Advisory Group (TAG) active now that will help the project progress. Ms. Barrett added that there will be more funding sources available for this round as well. Caltrans is now eligible to apply.

- iii. Projects Map Gallery Online Tool. There was no further discussion.
- b. <u>Mendocino Transit Authority</u>. Director Gjerde reported that the previous MTA Executive Director resigned, and that Jacob King has been appointed as Interim Executive Director.
- c. <u>North Coast Railroad Authority</u>. Director Haschak reported that there has not been a meeting lately, but there is one scheduled for next Monday.
- d. <u>MCOG Staff Summary of Meetings</u>. Ms. Barrett referred to her written staff report.
- e. MCOG Administration Staff
  - i. *Financial Update Budget Revenue*. Ms. Orth reported that the Local Transportation Fund (LTF) sales tax revenues for the first two months of fiscal year 2020/21 have come in at 5.1 percent above the County Auditor's budget estimate. The County Auditor does not intend to revise the local estimate before a full quarter of revenue is received. State Transit Assistance (STA) funds have not been received yet; reports show gasoline consumption down in April and rising through September.
  - ii. 2<sup>nd</sup> Conference on EV Charging Infrastructure 2020 October 7-8, 2020. Ms. Orth reported that about 200 stakeholders attended the online conference. She learned about current issues, state plans and multi-state coalitions. There have been significant advances in electric vehicles worldwide.
  - iii. *Miscellaneous*. Ms. Barrett reported that the virtual public meeting for the Gualala Downtown project has been moved to January 14. A preview of the project will be available on the Caltrans website.
  - iv. Next Meeting Date. Monday, December 7, 2020.
- f. MCOG Planning Staff
  - i. *Draft Coordinated Public Transit-Human Services Transportation Plan to SSTAC Meeting on November 16, 2020 for Public Review and Comment.* Ms. Ellard reported that the Coordinated Plan Public Workshop will be combined with the regular Social Services Transportation Advisory Council (SSTAC) meeting on November 16. This plan is an inventory of transportation needs and services for seniors, people with disabilities and low-income earners that must be updated every five years. The final plan will come to MCOG for adoption.
  - ii. *Miscellaneous*. Mr. Sookne reported that the Title VI plan for MCOG is up for renewal, which will be presented in the December meeting. The public participation plan will also be updated.
- g. <u>MCOG Directors</u>. Director Haschak reported that there has been a lot of concern in the Laytonville area over the accidents caused by elk crossing the highway. Director Jackman advised Director Haschak to contact Caltrans to put in extra signage.
- h. <u>California Association of Councils of Governments (CALCOG) Delegates</u>. No report was received.
- **10. Adjournment.** The meeting was adjourned at 2:47 p.m.

### **BACKGROUND:**

The Final FY 2020/21 Overall Work Program (totaling \$968,745) was adopted by MCOG on June 1, 2020. On October 5, 2020, the First Amendment was approved which reprogrammed carryover funds and increased the total to \$1,083,936.

There is now a need for a Second Amendment to program additional grant funding in Work Element 11 (Local Road Safety Plans) recently awarded by the State to the County Department of Transportation. In addition, funds which were pending for the cities of Willits and Fort Bragg have now been approved by Caltrans but are awaiting allocation. This amendment programs all of those funds, however, it is noted that a consultant contract will not be authorized until all funding has been officially *allocated* by Caltrans.

The purpose of this amendment is to revise the LRSP funding Work Element 11 funding as follows:

In addition \$8,000 in State PPM funding was previously programmed for MCOG staff, for a revised project total of \$316,900. As previously reported, MCOG staff will administer this project to hire a consultant to develop Local Road Safety Plans for the County and all four cities. The procurement process for this project is currently underway.

### Please note the TAC has not considered this amendment. The November TAC meeting was cancelled, and the award notification for the County funding was just recently received.

Proposed revisions are shown on the attached spreadsheets. In summary, the proposed amendment would revise the total work program from \$1,083,936 to \$1,212,836, an increase of \$128,900 (*from grant funding and local agency match*). Details are shown in **bold** and <del>strike out</del> on the attached financial summary sheets. The full amendment will be available upon request.

ACTION REQUIRED: Consider approval of Second Amendment to FY 2020/21 Overall Work Program.

### **TITLE:** Authorization to Apply for FY 2021-22 Caltrans Sustainable Transportation Planning Grants

### **BACKGROUND:**

Caltrans' annual Sustainable Transportation Planning Grant cycle will soon be starting for next fiscal year. MCOG staff has participated in workshops regarding the new draft grant guidelines in anticipation of the upcoming call for projects. The schedule is tentative; however, we expect to receive the grant announcement in December, with applications likely due by the end of January --- *before our next MCOG meeting in February*.

MCOG has a successful record of receiving these types of grants which provide transportation planning tools for local agencies and help to enrich our region. Some recent examples include this past year's SB 743 Vehicle Miles Traveled (VMT) Regional Baseline Study, and the 2019 Countywide Pedestrian Needs Assessment/ Engineered Feasibility Study. The recent Fire Vulnerability Assessment/Emergency Preparedness Plan project was also funded through this program (*under the SB 1 Adaptation planning category, which no longer exists*).

We have reviewed planning needs and are proposing that MCOG submit two grant applications this cycle, as explained below. In addition, we have offered to assist MTA staff with an application should they choose to apply. The transit agency qualifies on its own as an applicant and therefore does not need MCOG's sponsorship.

Proposed FY 2021-22 grant applications:

- <u>MCOG Travel Demand Model Update</u> MCOG's Travel Demand Model was developed in FY 2010/11 by Fehr and Peers, and is now ten years old. The final report for the SB 743 VMT study included recommendations to update MCOG's travel demand model, including recalibration and validation. Based on information from our SB 743 consultant, travel demand models should preferably be updated every five years, and ours is several years out of date.
- <u>Mobility Solutions/Transit Alternatives Study to Serve Communities Not Served by Transit</u> Transit service to remote communities (such as Laytonville and Covelo) has long been an unmet need in our County that cannot reasonably be served by traditional transit service, mainly due to distance and cost. The purpose of this study would be to investigate transit alternatives (including low-carbon or electric vehicle options) and research programs that have been successful in other rural communities, to determine if/how these communities could be served.

Attached is an excerpt from the draft grant guide which shows the various categories available. Both of these proposed projects would be eligible under the "Sustainable Communities Competitive program" which requires a local match of 11.47%. This category also includes a \$3 million "set-aside" for technical projects such as travel demand model updates. Cost estimates for these potential planning projects have not yet been developed. Consistent with past practice, staff proposes to indicate that the required local match will be provided from Local Transportation Funds in the annual Overall Work Program.

**ACTION REQUIRED:** Consider authorizing MCOG staff to submit FY 2021/21 Caltrans Sustainable Transportation Planning grant applications.

**ALTERNATIVES:** (1) Authorize MCOG staff to submit two FY 2021-22 Sustainable Transportation Planning grant applications to Caltrans as described above (*Recommended*); (2) Authorize staff to submit only one grant application, as determined by MCOG Board; (3) Do not authorize the submittal of any Caltrans Sustainable Transportation Planning grant applications for FY 2021-22.

**RECOMMENDATION:** Authorize MCOG staff to submit two FY 2021-22 Caltrans Sustainable Transportation Planning grant applications to Caltrans as described above.

TITLE: Title VI Program Update

### **BACKGROUND:**

All programs receiving financial assistance from the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) are subject to Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the Civil Rights Restoration Act of 1987, and the Department of Transportation's (DOT) implementing regulations. Title VI prohibits discrimination by recipients of Federal financial assistance on the basis of race, color, and national origin, including the denial of meaningful access for limited English proficient (LEP) persons. Section 601 of Title VI of the Civil Rights Acts on 1964 states the following:

"No person in the United States shall, on the ground of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance."

The term "program or activity" means all of the operations of a department, agency, special purpose district, or government; or the entity of such State or local government that distributes such assistance and each such department or agency to which the assistance is extended, in the case of assistance to a State or local government.

Since the Mendocino Council of Governments distributes FTA funds to the Mendocino Transit Authority, MCOG is required to comply with Title VI and DOT's regulations. FTA requires that all direct and primary recipients document their compliance with DOT's Title VI regulations by submitting a Title VI Program to their FTA regional civil rights officer once every three years or as otherwise directed by FTA. For all recipients (including sub-recipients), the Title VI Program must be approved by the recipient's board of directors or appropriate governing entity or official(s) responsible for policy decisions prior to submission to FTA. Sub-recipients (MCOG) shall submit Title VI Programs to the primary recipient (Caltrans) from whom they receive funding in order to assist the primary recipient in its compliance efforts.

The MCOG Title VI Program was originally adopted by the Board on August 18, 2014 and updated on December 4, 2017. The program stipulates that it be updated every 3 years. Staff has reviewed and incorporated the most current Census data into the attached updated 2020 MCOG Title VI Program. The difference in data between the 2017 and the 2020 Programs is minimal and doesn't require MCOG to change any practices or policies.

Staff will be prepared to discuss this topic further at the meeting.

**ACTION REQUIRED:** Approval of the updated Title VI Program.

ALTERNATIVES: The Board may choose not to approve the updated Title VI Program.

**RECOMMENDATION:** Staff recommends the Board approves the updated Title VI Program.

TITLE: Financial Update – FY 2020/21 Budget Revenues

### BACKGROUND:

I have been reporting monthly the revenues from the Transportation Development Act (TDA), which comprises the LTF and STA funds.

<u>LTF Revenues Fiscal Year-to-Date</u>. In continued good news, Local Transportation Fund (LTF) sales tax revenues for the first fiscal quarter have come in at 5.6 percent above the County Auditor's budget estimate, based on a monthly average. Auditor-Controller Lloyd Weer has met with the County's sales tax consultant, who reported the anticipated loss has not yet materialized, and that to date the County's actual sales tax revenues are about level with last year's actuals. (My own calculations based on first quarter deposits show a significant increase over the same quarter a year ago, noting the State advances a portion of the funds each quarter subject to later adjustment.) The consultant conservatively predicts an increase of about 2.5 percent for 2020/21. The actual revenues in 2019/20 were up 3.2 percent over the prior year's actuals.

Note that online California sales return a formula share of tax to Mendocino County.

<u>State Transit Assistance (STA)</u>. This fund is derived from gasoline and diesel taxes. We have received the first quarter of revenues to date, at \$173,566. This amount is 35 percent of the revised State Controller's estimate of \$492,043 (which was down 41 percent from preliminary), so came in at a higher rate than quarterly as an average. As reported earlier, gasoline consumption was increasing during this period, while still below the two-year high points statewide.

In related news, there continue to be efforts to replace the gas-consumption revenue model with a system based on vehicle miles. During the 2016 California Road Charge Pilot project, established by Senate Bill 1077 (DeSaulnier), "more than 5,000 vehicles from all over the state reported over 37 million miles driven, through six different reporting and recording methods ranging from manual methods to highly technical methods with optional location-based services." Starting in January 2021, the program "will test how road charge can work with four technologies: usage-based insurance, ridesharing, electric vehicle charging stations/pay-at-the-pump systems, and autonomous vehicles." ### BACKGROUND:

The 2015 Coordinated Public Transit – Human Services Transportation Plan (Coordinated Plan) was adopted by MCOG on March 2, 2015, and the required five-year update is currently underway. As was done with the 2015 plan, MCOG is working in partnership with the University of the Pacific's Center for Business and Policy Research (CBPR) to develop the 2020 update. This project is being funded by the State as part of a larger umbrella contract undertaken for several rural agencies.

An "outreach draft" of the Coordinated Plan update has been posted to MCOG's website for stakeholder and public review.

A virtual public workshop on the draft plan was held on November 9, as part of the SSTAC meeting. The consultant, Thomas Pogue, CBPR, gave a presentation to SSTAC members and community members on the draft plan update. Participants were invited to provide input on social service transportation needs (including those of seniors, low-income, and disabled individuals) and discuss other issues pertinent to social service transportation and coordination in the county.

The "outreach draft" may be viewed on MCOG's website at <u>www.mendocinocog.org</u>, and updates are in process. A public survey will also soon be posted to MCOG's website to gather additional stakeholder input.

We anticipate the final Coordinated Plan to be presented to MCOG for adoption in the spring, around March or April.
